

**CRIMINAL JUSTICE COORDINATING COUNCIL**  
**Minutes – March 19, 2015**

**No Quorum present at 3:00. Proceeded with Presentation regarding AODA Funding through the Rock County Human Services Department at 3:04 P.M.** Kate Flanagan from AODA presented a power point and attached handout. She stated that they currently have walk in clinics established on Wednesdays in Beloit and three days a week in Janesville. Mr. O’Leary stated that there is a greater need and asked about possibility of Mobile Team. Walk in clinics are held from 2 to 4 P.M. Alcohol and Heroin treatment are in high demand in Rock County. The Human Services AODA staff are engaging in a relationship with its clients until they can be placed into that next level of care. Ms. Moore asked if there are prevention funds. Yes, there are prevention funds and those services are provided by Janesville Mobilizing 4 Change.

**Call to Order.** Chair Nelson called the meeting of the Criminal Justice Coordinating Council to order at 3:23 P.M. in the Courthouse Conference Center on the second floor of the Rock County Courthouse-East.

**Approval of Agenda.** Sheriff Spoden moved approval of the agenda, second by Ms. Klyve. ADOPTED.

**Approval of Minutes of February 19, 2015.** One change, in others present it should be changed from Mike Fallow to Mike Fallon. Supervisor Grahn moved approval of the minutes with this change, second by Supervisor Kraft. ADOPTED.

**Update on Probation Revocation Article in Janesville Gazette on February 8, 2015, and Follow Up meeting between District Attorney and DOC.** Mr. O’Leary stated that he has met with the DOC. He stated that there is some upcoming cross-training. He would like to keep this on the agenda to discuss at a later date.

**Update on EBDM Initiative.** Ms. Pohlman McQuillen said three states were chosen to participate in the initiative. Six counties in Wisconsin will be participating with the state. Our Technical Assistance Provider will be Mimi Carter. She will be in Wisconsin one week per month and meet with Rock County on Wednesdays. The first EBDM meeting will be on April 15 at 9:00 A.M. The meeting will last approximately three and half hours. The Rock County Board of Supervisors approved a 16-person Ad Hoc committee. Fifteen of the committee members that will be recommended are key players in the Criminal Justice System. One slot is still open. It was suggested

that Beloit City Attorney Beth Krueger would be a good addition. These meetings will be open to the public. The statewide EBDM kick off will be June 29-30.

**Support for Seventh Annual Resource Fair.** The Seventh Annual Resource Fair sponsored by CJCC is scheduled for June 4 from 1-3:30 P.M. in Room K at the Rock County Job Center. Jim Neitzel and Elizabeth Pohlman McQuillen are working with a group of dedicated community members on this event. There was a motion for CJCC to support and sponsor this resource fair by Mr. O'Leary, second by Sheriff Spoden. ADOPTED.

**Discussion Regarding Law Enforcement Concerns.** Mr. Henderson thanked Sheriff Spoden for the help his office has given to City of Beloit Police Department. Beloit will secure their city with the help of other agencies. Sheriff Spoden stated that he is committed to helping the City of Beloit for as long as needed. Ms. Klyve thanked the Janesville Police Department and Rock County Sheriff for their help in apprehending a violent individual without incident. Chief Moore introduced Officer Brian Foster with the Janesville Police Department and turned the floor over to him. Officer Foster discussed the heroin project that he started in June 2014 and provided a handout. He currently has 26 active heroin addicts that he assists as a minimum on a weekly basis but most contacts are daily. He is currently not taking any new addicts as the availability of assistance is lagging. His credibility is on the line—when he tells addicts he can get them help, then it has to happen quickly. During this lag, someone needs to babysit the addicts to make sure they don't use while waiting for treatment. Housing is a struggle, as most landlords want an addict sober for at least 30 to 60 days. Mr. O'Leary stated that we may want the County Administrator to attend our next meeting so he is aware of the funding need. It was stated that Mr. Smith will be part of the EBDM committee. Mr. Henderson suggested that we communicate with the AODA Steering Committee to fill the gaps. Mr. Rankin stated that Dane County Mental Health used to have a street team that used to work well. Supervisor Grahn stated that we need a commitment from the CJCC to help out. Supervisor Kraft made a motion to Support Continued Effort to Advocate for Additional Funding for Substance Abuse Treatment, second by Mr. O'Leary. ADOPTED. Ms. Klyve suggested that we wait to go to Administration once all funding avenues have been explored.

**Consideration of Future Areas for CJCC Focus/Action.** None.

**Citizen Participation and Announcements.** Upcoming Heroin Town Hall meetings were announced. There are flyers up around the courthouse and were also handed out. Ms. Owens asked for clarification on heroin numbers. It was suggested that the Coroner would have documentation of anyone that has died of a heroin overdose in Rock County. Ms. Candy Schenck provided a handout on her son, Alex.

# AODA Treatment Programming and Funding





## Overview of AODA Programs

- ▶ AODA Block Grant Funding/AODA Walk-In Clinic
- ▶ Intoxicated Driver Program
- ▶ Detox Services
- ▶ Treatment Services for OWI Court and Drug Court
- ▶ Treatment Alternative Program
- ▶ CYF AODA Treatment Services
- ▶ Juvenile Justice AODA Grant
- ▶ Integrated Dual Disorder model in the Community Support Programs
- ▶ Co-occurring capacity development in the Outpatient Clinics

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*Highlighted Programs have been developed within the past 2-3 years as a result of strategic planning to improve access to care, target criminal justice populations , and promote co-occurring services*





## Accessing Treatment Funding

1. Assessment (walk in clinic)
2. Decision regarding financial eligibility and appropriate level of care
3. Authorization for specified funding with a selected contracted provider
4. Client engages in treatment
5. Provider bills HSD for services rendered
6. Client may be authorized for additional services at the recommendation of the provider and the approval of HSD
7. Continuous reconciliation at HSD between authorized funds and spent funds


## Maximizing Access to Insurance

- ▶ Uninsured clients are prompted to apply for Badgercare/Medicaid as appropriate as this will cover their Outpatient Services and medications, including Suboxone
- ▶ Clients are instructed regarding calling, accessing via internet, or visiting the Job Center.
- ▶ Coming soon: Computer kiosks at HSD clinics exclusively for online application for Badgercare

## Current Status 2015

- ▶ Unprecedented volume of requests for services
- ▶ Budgeted Treatment dollars = \$224,912
- ▶ YTD Authorized = \$179,242
- ▶ YTD paid = \$60,611



- ▶ Projected to be significantly over budget if the pace of referrals continues.
- ▶ Why? increasing need, improved access, possible latent demand, increased treatment advocacy.

## Moving Forward

- ▶ As demand continues to outpace resources, consider requesting additional funds in 2015 to meet the unprecedented need.
- ▶ Track data to quantify the growing need to inform potential future budget requests.
- ▶ Continue to fund strategic prevention efforts targeting opiate abuse
- ▶ Maximize access to non tax levy funding streams through streamlined Badger Care applications for eligible clients
- ▶ Expand Comprehensive Community Services (CCS) to provide wide-ranging psychosocial rehabilitation services to eligible clients with addictions
- ▶ Partner with stakeholder groups (BHRSC, CJCC) to engage in county wide problem solving to address the increasing need for treatment resources in Rock County.
- ▶ AODA Steering Committee continue to work to increase local provider resources in Rock County and advise on ways to prioritize use of limited treatment dollars for the uninsured.

Issues

1 — time taken to get them into institutions has increased significantly

2 — allowing only one month of covered treatment.

\*\* The need here is for clients to be placed into in-patient AODA as expeditiously as possible.

## OUT-PATIENT

During the outpatient process the D.R.O.P. Officer works with the client to find employment, receive education, clear up legal issues and find housing.

The Job Center in Janesville assists in finding placement jobs for clients.

\*\* No current assistance exists for finding schooling for clients.

Legal issues – the District Attorney and ADA's have been very helpful and supportive to those clients working the program.

\*\* There are many potential housing facilities but may have too high of expectations for a new client.

\*\* Requires a contact person who can facilitate enrollment to further education, addressing both academic and financial issues.  
\*\* Requires someone to expedite placement into appropriate housing, assisting with financial needs.
